Commerce Lexington's Economic Development team tours UK's Cornerstone

In January, the Economic Development team received an invitation to tour the University of Kentucky's recently announced innovative campus-community partnership located at The Cornerstone, UK's newest 26,000 square foot facility designed to foster community, creativity, technology, entrepreneurship and equitable economic development. We are optimistic to continue conversations and collectively foster business recruitment projects and retention among students in one of Lexington's key target industries – the high-tech industry.

Coldstream Groundbreaking

In February, Commerce Lexington's Economic Development team joined representatives from the University of Kentucky, the Woodbury Corporation and state and local officials, and broke ground on what will soon become a home for early stage, high-tech companies from across Kentucky. The new \$15 million development, called The Core, on UK's Coldstream Research Campus will offer early-stage companies office and laboratory space in an environment where they can further develop and commercialize their products and services. The project was supported and expedited through partnerships with state, city, and local officials. A product development initiative (PDI) grant created by the state and the Kentucky Association for Economic Development and supported by Commerce Lexington Inc., enabled the Coldstream Research Campus to receive a \$500,000 matching grant to develop lab space in the new building. "This is exciting news for Lexington and Central Kentucky," said Ray Daniels, Commerce Lexington Inc. board chair. "Having new lab space is critical not only to further generate ideas and innovation, but also to use as a tool in recruiting new business to Lexington. This will be a tremendous asset

to grow our technology and life sciences sectors, as it will create more opportunities for expansion. The Commerce Lexington economic development team was proud to work with University of Kentucky officials to help secure the grant for this project. It was a true team effort."



Bluegrass Alliance Site Consultant Initiative

In first quarter 2021, Commerce Lexington Economic Development's team hosted the monthly Bluegrass Alliance Group (BGA) meeting virtually. Currently we are planning a direct mail outreach initiative to consultants over the next two quarters. To close the year, the plan is to return to hosting site consultants in person at our yearly Economic Development luncheon in Atlanta.

Our regional group has been together for over 25 years and has been very successful in building trust and partnerships. Commerce Lexington Inc. receives many Request for Proposals from consultants and works to organize responses in a regional nature to leverage the strength of the Bluegrass area.

Lexington and Kentucky Recognized in Site Selection Magazine's 2020 Annual Project Rankings

Site Selection Magazine recognized Kentucky and the Lexington area as top locations in the United States for new and expanding facilities in its annual Project Rankings report. The ranking's database focuses on new corporate facility projects that meet at least one of three criteria: (a) a capital investment of at least \$1 million, (b) create at least 20 new jobs or (c) add at least 20,000 sq. ft. of new floor area. The number of projects were down across the country, the decline was only slight; Lexington had a total of 18 of the 152 projects in Kentucky in 2020, compared to 25 of the 164 projects in 2019.






New Micro-Internship Opportunity with University of Kentucky

The University of Kentucky's new Micro-Internship Program provides organizations with an opportunity to recruit and work with local college students. By participating



in this program, businesses can gain early access to high-potential students, support diversity and inclusion efforts, and enhance their brand on campus, all of which lead to improved hiring outcomes. Micro-Internships don't replace existing internship programs or on-campus recruiting efforts, but do offer a new way to connect to talented students with real-time project needs.

These micro-Internships provide businesses with opportunities to engage students on short-term, paid, professional projects. Beyond the on-demand support, this helps companies identify, engage, and assess potential hires. It is also a great way to support the local community. Through these projects, local college students and recent grads gain valuable, professional experiences to help launch their careers right here in Central Kentucky.

What is a Micro-Internship?

Micro-internships are short-term, professional assignments, comparable to those tasks that could be given to a new hire or a summer intern.

- Projects typically range from 10–40 hours in duration.
- Companies set the fixed price the student will be paid for each microinternship. The average cost to a company is often between \$150 and \$600 depending on the project scope.
- Projects are used in all industries, across all departments and can take place year-round.
- Projects can be completed remotely.
- Allows businesses to assess an intern's competences, including core skills such as communication, problem-solving, and grit that are otherwise difficult to evaluate.
- There are no commitments or administrative burdens since the students participating in micro-internships are not your employees or contractors.

How It Works

- 1. Post Your Project Online
- Think about the tasks you want done, but don't have the time for.
- 2. Select Who You Want
- You'll only see candidates who have proactively expressed interest in completing your assignment.
- 3. The Work Gets Done
- You can communicate with the student as much or as little as you want and in whatever way is easiest for you.

New Superintendent Search underway for Fayette County Public Schools

Fayette County Public Schools is in the process of hiring a new superintendent and recently secured Greenwood Asher & Associates—an executive search firm—to assist the local school board in the search for the next superintendent. Both Betsy Dexter and Bob Quick participated in small input sessions to provide thoughts and



perspective on what the business community would like to see in our next Superintendent. The input gathered will inform the Superintendent Profile that will be used in the national search.

Next steps in the process:

April

- Search firm and screening committee will review the leading prospects and select candidates for the interview phase.
- Round 1 interviews will be conducted by the search firm and the screening committee.

May

- Screening committee will determine which candidates to recommend to the school board.
- Interviews will be conducted by school board members.
- Finalists will be announced.
- Stakeholder groups will host interview panels.

June

• School board will select a new superintendent.
