Commerce Lexington- Talent and Workforce Development Monthly Report- March 2021

A. Describe work in the previous month to connect upper-level students to jobs or internships in local corporation and companies for graduate level, senior year, and junior year students within their identified area of interest:

We continue to work with the secondary and post-secondary systems as they prepare to connect students to local businesses. The University of Kentucky's Career Services office continues to offer opportunities for employers to connect with UK students and alumni and we work closely with them monthly through the UK Economic Development Collaborative Talent Subcommittee.

We are also working on ways to promote and increase the number of micro-internships with CLX members. These internships allow recent graduates to demonstrate their skills as they seek a full-time role or internship. Not only will local companies get immediate support, but micro-Internships also help them identify and evaluate prospective job candidates for full-time employment when the time is right. As a result, organizations improve hiring effectiveness, enhance diversity, and drive retention.

Due to Covid-19 and healthy at work restrictions, we do not have updated numbers.

C. Describe work in the previous month with Fayette County Public Schools to connect interested junior level students with jobs or internships in local companies in their identified area of interest as part of the Career Academies of Lexington:

N/A- Due to Covid 19 and school not being in person, we do not have an update on student placements.

D. Meetings with education leadership in Lexington related to issues to assist in the development of workforce and growing the Lexington economy/jobs:

Commerce Lexington is working with the Fayette County School Board to find the best candidate for the next superintendent. We provided input on a Superintendent profile and will participate in public forums and interview panels with potential candidates in the next few months.

In partnership with FCPS, we have started work with The Center for Global Education (CGE) to participate in a series of learning opportunities to share and apply effective global practices to transform education for students with learning differences and to ensure healthy social emotional development for all students. The impetus of the work is to assist district systems in addressing the extensive social emotional learning (SEL) and mental health needs of students and adults brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic. Focusing on building SEL skills will ultimately impact their chances of standing out in a hiring pool. Things like self-awareness and good communication can be considered SEL skills, but they also fall under the category of soft skills, which is critical for our future workforce.
